# THE SCENES MOVIES

Televisual's fifth survey of the UK film industry kicks off with a showcase of the country's top 40 indie production companies, from Aardman through to Working Title. Tim Dams reports

elcome to the Film 40, Televisual's fifth annual survey of the UK film industry. The Film 40 is published in the same month as the Cannes Film Festival. where two British films - Andrea Arnold's American Honey and Ken Loach's I Daniel Blake - play in competition. The Film 40 is our annual guide to the behind the scenes talent and facilities of the UK's film production industry. It kicks off with a round up of the top 40 film producers in the UK, and in subsequent

pages we profile the UK's leading DPs, grading artists, studios and vfx houses.

The big change since the Film 40 began five years ago is how film producers have pushed into TV drama. All leading UK film producers including 42, Blueprint, Big Talk, Heyday, Cuba, Number

9, Origin, Revolution, Scott Free and See-Saw and Working Title - have TV divisions working for broadcasters who are looking for shows told with the high-end production values of film.

#### HOW IT WORKS

The Film 40 survey of UK indie producers has been compiled with off-the-record guidance

and input from leading film producers, agents, financiers and PR consultants. But the choice of companies is Televisual's alone.

We have chosen the following companies based on their reputation within the industry. The companies selected are those that have a track record of making films that attract box office, critical acclaim and/or awards. They are not just producers for hire - rather they are producers who look for and develop scripts, attach talent to projects, raise finance and risk

> their own money in films that they believe in. We've also tried to pick companies that are capable of making a broad slate of films.

Missing from the list are companies that are owned by broadcasters (like Film4 and BBC Films) as well as outfits that are predominantly

distributors (StudioCanal, Lionsgate, Pathe) or financiers (Ingenious, Prescience).

The 40 companies are working in an environment where it is as tough as ever to get projects financed. Nevertheless, they're behind some of the big successes of UK cinema in recent years, contributing to the £1.4bn spent on UK film production in 2015.

#### BEN PUGH, RORY AITKEN, JOSH VARNEY AND KATE BUCKLEY

42 is a production and talent management company, formed in 2013 by four partners: producers Aitken and Pugh; and managers Varney and Buckley. Future releases include Eran Creevy's Collide, Johannes Roberts' The Other Side of the Door for 20th Century Fox. Fernando Coimbra's Sand Castle. # **AARDMAN** PETER LORD, DAVID SPROXTON

The UK's leading animation producer, Aardman produces films, TV series, ads and digital entertainment, Director Nick Park is working on his first film since Oscar winner Wallace and Gromit. # ARCHERY

Archery was launched in 2014 by former Scott Free London head Liza Marshall, and PeaPie's Kris Thykier. Coming up is Asif Kapdia's Azerbaijan-set feature Ali & Nino. Archery has also pushed into TV, winning a Sky Atlantic commission for Riviera, from Oscar-winning writer and director Neil Jordan.

# ALTITUDE

Launched by former Optimum boss Will Clarke in 2012, Altitude is a rare example of a vertically integrated UK company spanning production, finance, distribution and sales. Altitude recently released music industry satire *Kill Your Friends* which it produced with Gregor Cameron, and has signed on to Asif Kapadia's doc about Diego Maradona.

# **BIGTALK**

# CLOUD EIGHT CHRISTIAN COLSON



# BLUEPRINT

GRAHAM BROADBENT, PETE CZERNIN



lueprint has established itself as one of the UK's pre-eminent producers having enjoyed huge commercial success with *The Best Exotic Marigold Hotel* and its 2015 sequel. The franchise has proved a wildly successful money spinner for Blueprint, with the two films taking over \$210m at the global box office between them.

It's now in post on the highly anticipated Colin Firth-starring film about round the world amateur sailor Donald Crowhurst, directed by James Marsh. And it is also producing *Three Miles North Of Molkom*, written and directed by Dan Mazer. Both are being backed by StudioCanal, which has forged close ties with Blueprint.

Like many film outfits, Blueprint is now making its first foray into the (relatively) more stable world of television drama. Last year, it produced BBC1's 2x90-min adaptation of Sadie Jone's best selling coming-of-age novel *The Outcast*. It's recently been commission to make *The Last Dragonslayer* for Sky1, based on the Jasper Fforde series of novels.

Blueprint co-founder Pete Czernin is on the BFI's governing board. Meanwhile, Broadbent was previously a co-founder of Dragon Pictures and Mission Pictures with Damian Jones.

# CUBA

Set up in 2008, the production arm of agency Curtis Brown has strong ties to the BBC, producing three features – Broken, London Road and this year's The Ones Below with BBC Films. Its TV arm is active too: it has so far produced Boy A and Coalition for C4 and Jonathan Strange & Mr Norrell for BBC1. It is currently working on new commissions McMafia for BBC1 and Paula for BBC2. # DNA FILMS



DAMIAN IONES



amian Jones is one of the UK's most entrepreneurial and consistent producers, having made over 30 feature films from the Oscar-winning The Iron Lady to The Lady in the Van, Belle, The History Boys and Dad's Army.

Released back in February, the latter took a respectable £8m at the UK box office.

A one-man band producer,
Jones is also behind another
television spin-off – the upcoming
film adaptation of BBC comedy
Absolutely Fabulous, set for
release in July, and which reunites
stars Joanna Lumley and Jennifer
Saunders. The story sees the pair
blamed for a major incident at an
uber fashionable launch party,

causing them to flee penniless to the French Riviera to plot their return to London. Mandie Fletcher directs from a script by Jennifer Saunders. The BBC and Fox Searchlight are co-financing.

Jones is also working on Goodbye Christopher Robin with director Simon Curtis and Pinewood and Pathe as backers, and is developing a biography of Alexander McQueen with Chris Urch and Andrew Haigh. Meanwhile, Jones is also executive producing Roger Spottiswoode's Streetcat Named Bob and Jenny Lu's The Receptionist.

# WORKINGTITLE



orking Title remains the UK's pre-eminent production company. Backed by Universal Pictures via a first look deal, it delivers two to four films a year which marry a British sensibility with Hollywood production values. Working Title also has a close relationship with StudioCanal. Founded in 1983, the company has produced more than 100 films that have grossed over \$6bn worldwide. Its films have won 12 Academy Awards, including one for Tom Hooper's latest The Danish Girl. Working Title's current slate

includes Hail Caesar! Bevan and Fellner's eighth film with Joel and Ethan Coen, Bridget Jones's Baby directed by Sharon Maguire starring Renee Zellwegger and Colin Firth, and The Snowman, directed by Tomas Alfredson starring Michael Fassbender, Rebecca Ferguson and Val Kilmer.
